POSGCD eyes water discharge

The Post Oak Savannah Groundwater Conservation District recently monitored the San Antonio Water System's flushing of 10 million gallons of water daily exported from Burleson County into a northside San Antonio creek.

And they are still asking questions.

Water is being exported from a field in Burleson County off F.M. 696 to San Antonio, a process that began in




